<b>Hazards, broken glass, sharp objects, dogs mess</b> Risk cuts grazes, injuries	All	<b>Only litter pickers provided by the leaders are to be used to pick up these objects &amp; broken glass or sharp objects are to be picked up by your leader in charge. Squirrels to point out objects for adults to pick up</b> Adults only to handle difficult objects. Leader to carry newspaper to wrap any sharp things before placing in the bag <i>Leaders to carry first Aid kit rucksack</i>	
<b>Hazards- Roads.</b> Risk of injury from moving vehicles when walking along or crossing roads	All	<b>Walk in pairs and stay on the path. Leaders to supervise crossing the road. Adults to walk on roadside of path</b> High viz jackets to be worn over uniform/clothing	
<b>Hazard- Ratio of adults to children</b> Risk, injury /death due to insufficient adult supervision	Young Person	<b>Minimum requirements for outside activities as per POR</b>	
<b>Hazard – lost person</b> Risk death/injury	Young Person	<b>Head count before leaving the hut &amp; at regular intervals along the route &amp; before returning to the hut</b> Adults to be vigilant all the time	
<b>Hazard handling the rubbish</b> Risk illness or disease	Young person	<b>All squirrels to bring &amp; wear gloves. Encouraged to wash their hands straight after the litter pick on return to the hut. Sanitiser to be carried incase</b> <b>Adults to wear gloves too</b>	
<b>Hazards Dogs,</b> Risk injury, death animals	All	<b>Discuss dangers before setting out, mention dangers on OSM</b> <b>Do not approach or touch dogs or any other animals</b> <b>If a dog approached stand still hands tucked in</b>	
<b>Hazard allergic reaction to bee/wasp sting</b> Risk injury/death	All	<b>Check OSM for anyone who may have an allergic reaction &amp; carry appropriate medication if requires.</b>	

Don't forget, as part of your programme planning, you should have contingency activities in reserve just in case you can't do what was planned or you need to stop half way through. Make sure this is shared with those involved, so everyone knows how to respond. You should have risk assessed contingency activities prior to them taking place and communicated key information to those involved as with all activities.
